REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING

Speaker: Eric Mens introduced Melissa Monroe, Deputy Director, Brunswick County Board of Elections. Melissa addressed issues related to voting in Brunswick County, her job responsibilities, how the growth in the County (particularly the influx of residents into the northern part of the County) has affected her job, and the need for volunteers to work at the polls on each election day. During Presidential election years, as many as 400 poll workers are needed to work at locations throughout Brunswick County. Pay is a minimum of \$150 on Election Day. Orientation and computer skills training for potential poll workers starts this month and runs through February. Post 68 Success Story: In a surprise visit to Post 68, Air Force Chief Master Sergeant Michael De Slaughter presented Post 68 with a Memorandum expressing thanks for our participation in providing cards, letters, and cookies to Air Force personnel deployed in Incirlik, Turkey over the 2017 holidays. Accompanying the letter was a flag that was carried aboard an A-10 Warthog from the 74th Expeditionary Fighter Squadron (Flying Tigers) on December 17th and onboard an KC-135R Stratotanker during Operation Inherent Resolve on December 27, 2017. Appropriate Certificates of Authenticity accompanied the flag. Thank you to all our members who took the time to write cards (each envelope also included a Post 68 business card and cut-out star) and in particular, to Patty Kelley for baking delicious chocolate chip cookies for the troops! Service Officer Report: Dale Todd, Post Service Officer, reported the following:

- Mr. Wright passed away one week ago. Mr. Wright was not a member of our Post but came to our attention through Anita Hartsell, Senior Veterans Service Officer, Brunswick County Veterans Services. Several Post members have been involved with Mr. Wright over the last few months by providing him with transportation to his medical appointments. With his death, our services are no longer needed.
- Mr. Cote first came to our attention as a veteran in need through Meals-On-Wheels. As a result of our involvement, Brunswick Housing Opportunity has arranged for a local electrician to resolve the electrical issues with his home; a Seabees organization has agreed to build a handicapped ramp for him; and we are working with the local Meineke shop (veteranowned) to address his vehicle problems. We will ascertain the final, limited amount that we are willing to provide towards the vehicle repairs and follow-up on the other work scheduled at his house.
- Veterans Benefits Action Center (VBAC) remains in the planning stages for 2018 and has been renamed the Veterans Benefits Experience Center (VBEC). A veterans "Stand-down" will be held on site as well to provide showers, clean clothing, food, and medical and dental services to the area's homeless veterans.

Update on Projects/Initiatives

- **High School Project** Rick de Moya reported that he recently met with Paul Price, Principal of North Brunswick High School (NBHS,) and several school staff members on the NBHS Flag Pole and Freedom Wall Project. The Freedom Wall will be located outside the library and will house copies of historical documents (e.g., the Declaration of Independence, Constitution, etc.). Over the years, add-ons to the main high school building have resulted in the flag pole now being at the center of the school. Construction of a flagpole plaza in front of the school is somewhat problematic due to several large swamp oaks that have grown in the potential plaza location and that will most likely need to be cut down or relocated (if possible). Completion date is scheduled for May 2018. However, due to the plaza issues, it is very likely that the project will not be completed until the Fall 2018. This project is a joint Post 68 and Kiwanis Club of North Brunswick effort. Kiwanis has agreed to provide \$1,000 towards funding the project. Post 68 involvement will primarily be in the planning and construction phases of the project, as well as possible needed fundraising depending upon the final design of the project.
- American Legion Oratorical Competition Rick de Moya reported that he recently attended the Oratorical Competition held at Legion Post 543 St. James. NBHS currently does not have a Speakers Club but the principal is supportive of establishing one in the future. Rick will attend the Division 9 competition that will be held at Wilmington Post 10 in February in the hopes that Post 68 will be able to conduct its own competition next year.

- The Commander reported that Post 68 is gaining more recognition in the community as we have been invited to participate in Leland's Parks and Recreation (P&R) Advisory Committees and thereby provide input into future P&R community projects.

Poll workers-the face and heart of the elections process!

Each election, hundreds of poll workers are utilized in order to facilitate an efficient, accurate election in Brunswick County.

We rely on volunteers interested in serving their community and ensuring the election is conducted in accordance with election laws.



Poll workers are needed to staff every polling place in the county—

- To greet voters and direct them to the correct location
- Answer questions and provide customer service
- Check voters in on an electronic poll book system
- Issue voters the correct ballot on electronic voting machines
- Ensure every voter is offered the opportunity to cast a ballot

Is being a poll worker right for you?

There is a lot involved in being a poll worker—training, time and knowledge! How do you know if it is a good fit for you?

Review the requirements to determine if it might be right for you.

A poll worker must:

- Be a registered voter in Brunswick County
- Not currently an office-holder, candidate or near relative of a candidate
- Not currently an official of a political party, including precinct party officials
- Be able to work the entire day on Election Day—6:00 am until at least 8:30 pm—this may involve sitting or standing for extended periods of time
- Have moderate computer skills—we use electronic poll books!
- Have an active, individual, regularly checked email account—we rely on electronic communication!
- Regular access to the internet
- Attend orientation and successfully complete computer class

What are the "perks"?

- Paid stipend for working election day! -Minimum of \$150!
- All training provided!
- Opportunity to work early voting for an hourly pay rate!
- Great experience to add to your resume!
- Serve your community and get to know your neighbors!

How do you start?

The first step in becoming a poll worker is to attend **Poll Worker Orientation.**

This is your introduction to elections and the ABCs of being a Poll Worker. This free, informational seminar is required for all new poll workers and available as a refresher course to returning poll workers. All are welcome. Please sign-up to receive reminders and to ensure the instructor has adequate material prepared. This class will be held in the County Commissioner's Chambers at the Government Complex.

Incirlik AB, Turkey

On December 27, 2017, this flag was flown on a combat mission during Operation INHERENT RESOLVE. It flew on a KC-135R Stratotanker, Call Sign Octane 52, Tail#64-14834. It completed an aerial refueling mission over hostile territory in support of a flight of F-15 Eagles as well as an E-3 Sentry (AWACS) aircraft. Flown by dedicated members of the United States Air Force, this flag represents our commitment to the Global War on Terror.
